

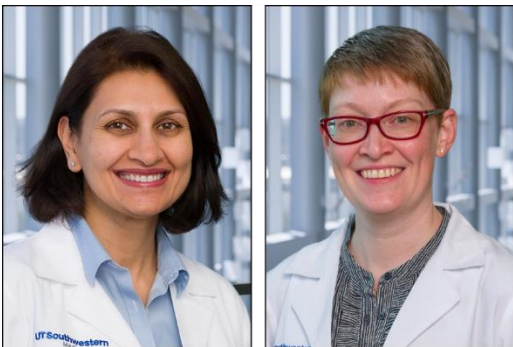

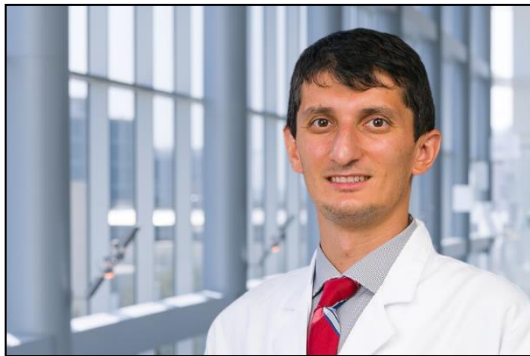

Interest Group Participants Publish Findings on Rare Blood Disorders



Taha Bat, M.D., an Assistant Professor in the Division of Hematology and Oncology, and members of the Bone Marrow Failure Interest Group recently published findings on rare hematologic disorders.

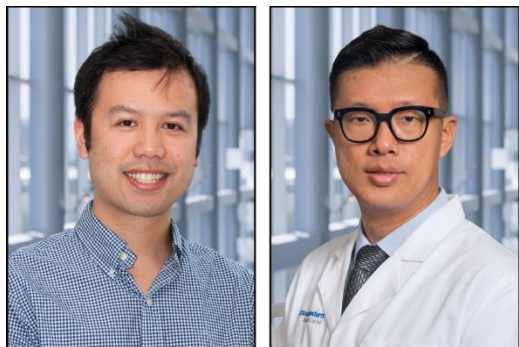
“Part of our mission is to cultivate and support new hematologists,” Dr. Bat says. “Our interest group has more than 30 trainees who are learning about rare hematologic disorders by shadowing hematologists, socializing with them, and participating in robust research.”

Zehra Tombul B.S., a second-year medical student, was first author of [a study in the *British Journal of Haematology*](#) that focused on genetic factors influencing the risk of bone marrow failure diseases which highlighted potential targets for future therapeutic interventions. Additional authors from UT Southwestern were research assistant **Merve Ozturk, M.D.**, second-year medical student **Ahmet Toprak, B.S.**, Associate Professor **Ibrahim Ibrahim, M.D.**, second-year medical student **Munevver Duran, B.A.**, and Dr. Bat.

Dr. Bat also joined colleagues from the U.S., Italy, and France to publish [a study in the journal *Blood*](#) on paroxysmal nocturnal hemoglobinuria and its association with thromboembolic disease, providing novel insights into its pathogenesis and potential therapeutic strategies.

Lam, Kim Receive AHA Grants



Nicholas Lam, Ph.D., and Han Kyul Kim, Ph.D., both Instructors in the Division of Cardiology, have received grants from the American Heart Association (AHA).

Dr. Lam, left, was awarded the AHA Career Development Award and the AHA Second Century Early Faculty Independence Award. He opted for the three-year Faculty Independence Award for his project, "Induction of Cytokinesis in Multinuclear Cardiomyocytes to Treat Heart Failure."

Originally from Melbourne, Australia, Dr. Lam holds a bachelor's degree in reproductive and developmental biology from the University of Melbourne and a degree in stem cell biology from Monash University with honors, where he also earned a doctorate in cardiac regeneration.

He completed two postdoctoral fellowships at UT Southwestern, studying molecular biology in the lab of **Eric Olson, Ph.D.**, and heart regeneration in the lab of **Hesham Sadek, M.D., Ph.D.**, who will serve as his primary mentor. Dr. Lam joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2020.

Dr. Kim was awarded a three-year Career Development Award for his investigation into the role of "Metabolic Acidosis for Treating Hypertension and Sympathetic Overactivation in Chronic Kidney Disease." He will be mentored by **Wanpen Vongpatanasin, M.D., Masaki Mizuno, Ph.D., Scott Smith, Ph.D., and Orson Moe, M.D.**

Originally from South Korea, Dr. Kim received his doctoral degree in exercise physiology from the University of Florida. He completed a postdoctoral fellowship in the Cardiology Division's Hypertension section at UT Southwestern and then joined the faculty in 2021.

Dr. Olson holds the Pogue Distinguished Chair in Research on Cardiac Birth Defects, the Robert A. Welch Distinguished Chair in Science, and the Annie and Willie Nelson Professorship in Stem Cell Research.

Dr. Hesham holds the J. Fred Schoellkopf, Jr. Chair in Cardiology.

Dr. Vongpatanasin holds the Fredric L. Coe Professorship in Nephrolithiasis Research in Mineral Metabolism and the Norman and Audrey Kaplan Chair in Hypertension.

Dr. Smith, a Distinguished Teaching Professor, holds the Jere H. Mitchell, M.D. Distinguished Professorship in Clinical Research.

Dr. Moe holds the Donald W. Seldin Professorship in Clinical Investigation and the Charles Pak Distinguished Chair in Mineral Metabolism.

Vanderbilt’s Jonathan Mosley to Speak on April 12



Jonathan Mosley, M.D., Ph.D., an Associate Professor of Internal Medicine and Biomedical Informatics at Vanderbilt University, will present a Cardiology Seminar on Friday, April 12, at noon in E6.200. His topic: “Following the Money, Genome First.”

Dr. Mosley holds a bachelor’s degree in mathematics and computer science from Dickinson College. He received his medical degree and his doctoral degree from Case Western Reserve University and completed internal medicine residency training at Vanderbilt, where he also obtained fellowship training. Additionally, he holds a master’s degree in

epidemiology from the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health.

Dr. Mosley focuses his research on developing approaches that integrate genetic data sources including electronic health record systems and large epidemiological studies, to identify genetically-modulated risk factors and biomarkers that impact health and disease.
