Burstein to Assume New Leadership Roles



Ezra Burstein, M.D., Ph.D., a Professor of Internal Medicine and Division Chief of Digestive and Liver Diseases, will lead a new endowed center dedicated to research in inflammatory digestive diseases, while also serving as the inaugural Director of the Jean Wilson Society, which will support the development of physician-scientists across the Department.

The new research center will leverage the substantial strengths at UT Southwestern related to inflammatory bowel disease, gastrointestinal biology, and immunity. Further, it should catalyze the introduction of new research initiatives and the recruitment of additional outstanding investigators to the

Department and UT Southwestern.

The Jean Wilson Society will advance the Department's historical commitment to promoting the success of early career physician-scientists. Dr. Burstein will work closely with the Department's vice chairs, division chiefs, and faculty to support trainees interested in careers as physician-scientists; provide personalized guidance for early-career faculty in the clinical scholar or tenure track; assist with identification of mentors and with networking, locally and outside, the institution; create educational programs for trainees and faculty; and assist with physician-scientist recruitment.

With his new responsibilities, Dr. Burstein will step away from his role as Division Chief of Digestive and Liver Diseases once an appropriate successor is identified. During his tenure, the division has not only grown considerably, but has strengthened its well-deserved reputation as one of the best GI divisions in the nation, with world-class clinical, research, and educational programs.

A nationwide search for Dr. Burstein's successor will begin soon, with a search committee led by **James de Lemos, M.D.**, Division Chief of Cardiology. In the meantime, Dr. Burstein will continue to lead the division and to work energetically to ensure its ongoing success.

Dr. Burstein holds the Berta M. and Dr. Cecil O. Patterson Chair in Gastroenterology.

Dr. de Lemos holds the Sweetheart Ball – Kern Wildenthal, M.D., Ph.D., Distinguished Chair in Cardiology.

Patel Elected Regional Governor of Gastroenterology Organization



Neha Patel, M.D., an Associate Professor in the Division of Digestive and Liver Diseases, has been elected a regional governor for the American College of Gastroenterology (ACG). Dr. Patel will serve a term of three years.

The ACG is an international medical association of gastroenterologists, founded in 1932, with more than 14,000 members from 86 countries.

Originally from Queens, New York, Dr. Patel holds a bachelor's degree in biology with a double minor in psychology and chemistry from the University of Miami in Coral Gables,

Florida. She earned her medical degree with honors from the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine and completed an internal medicine residency – with a focus on women's health – at Northwestern University McGaw Medical Center. She then obtained advanced training through a fellowship program in gastroenterology and liver diseases at UT Southwestern.

Dr. Patel joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2014.

VanWagner Named Starzl Lecturer



Lisa VanWagner, M.D., an Associate Professor in the Division of Digestive and Liver Diseases, has been selected to deliver the Thomas E. Starzl Transplant Surgery State-of-the-Art Lecture at the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases (AASLD) Liver Meeting in November. Her topic: "Life after a Liver: Victories, Challenges, and Opportunities for More."

Named after Thomas Starzl, M.D., the surgeon who performed the world's first human liver transplant in 1963, the annual lecture recognizes Dr. Starzl's pioneering work to elevate liver transplantation from an experimental procedure to one that

saves thousands of lives annually.

Dr. VanWagner holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from Northwestern University. She received her medical degree from the University of Virginia School of Medicine and completed residency training at Northwestern University's McGaw Medical Center in Chicago, where she served as Chief Resident and obtained a master's degree in clinical investigation from the Northwestern University Graduate School. She then remained at Northwestern to receive fellowship training in gastroenterology and hepatology, followed by an advanced fellowship program in transplant hepatology.

Dr. VanWagner joined the UT Southwestern Faculty in 2022.

Levine and Colleagues Examine Racial Disparities in Sports Cardiology



Racial disparities in cardiovascular health, including sudden cardiac death (SCD), affect both the general population and athletes. Among competitive athletes, health outcomes may be influenced by social determinants of health and structural racism, but our understanding remains incomplete. In a recent [study published in JAMA Cardiology](#), **Benjamin Levine, M.D.**, a Professor in the Division of Cardiology and Director of the Institute for Exercise and Environmental Medicine at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Dallas, and colleagues examined disparities in SCD risk, false-positive cardiac screening rates among athletes, and the prevalence of left ventricular hypertrophy. The authors called for a reexamination of race-

based practices in sports cardiology, such as interpretation of screening 12-lead electrocardiogram findings.

Dr. Levine holds the Distinguished Professorship in Exercise Sciences at UT Southwestern and the S. Finley Ewing Chair for Wellness and the Harry S. Moss Heart Chair for Cardiovascular Research at Texas Health Presbyterian Dallas.

Olaniran Accepted into KL2 Scholars Program



Kabir Olaniran, M.D., M.P.H., an Assistant Professor in the Division of Nephrology, has been accepted into the KL2 Clinical Scholars Program, which is part of the Clinical and Translational Science Award (CTSA) Program. The two-year program is designed to support early career faculty who are interested in becoming independently funded clinical and translational science investigators.

Originally from Nigeria, Dr. Olaniran earned his medical degree at the University of Lagos, Nigeria. He completed internal medicine residency training at Lincoln Medical Center in the Bronx, New York, where he also served as Chief Medical

Resident. He completed advanced training through a fellowship in nephrology at Harvard Medical School. He also holds a Master of Public Health degree from Harvard University.

Dr. Olaniran currently runs an early intervention kidney disease clinic for people with sickle cell disease at Parkland and UT Southwestern. His research focuses on the identification of novel biomarkers for the early detection of kidney abnormalities in sickle cell disease. His KL2 research mentors are **Orson Moe, M.D.**, and **Robert Toto, M.D.**

Dr. Moe holds the Donald W. Seldin Professorship in Clinical Investigation and the Charles Pak Distinguished Chair in Mineral Metabolism.

Dr. Toto, a Distinguished Teaching Professor, holds the Mary M. Conroy Professorship in Kidney Disease.

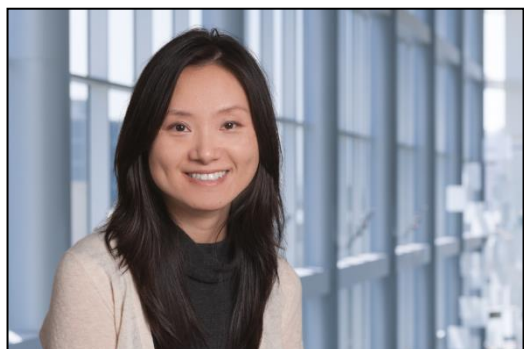

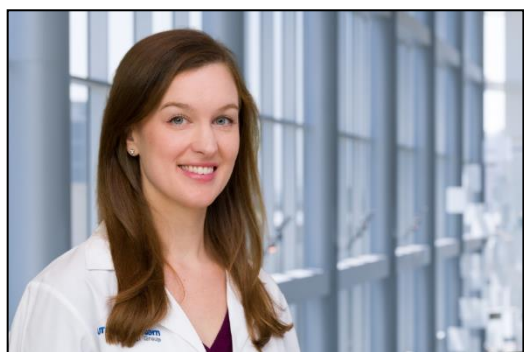
