Forty-two Faculty Members Promoted



Each year the Department's Promotion & Tenure Committee meets to consider nominations for faculty promotions, and then makes recommendations to the Chair. The Chair then forwards those nominations to the Dean, who decides which nominees to submit to the UT System Board of Regents for final approval.

This year, 42 faculty members were promoted. All of them participated in a lengthy and rigorous process, demonstrating accomplishments that warranted their promotion. Eight faculty members received promotions to Professor, one to Clinical Professor, and one to Professor with tenure. Thirty-two others

were promoted to Associate Professor or Clinical Associate Professor.

The Department celebrates their achievements and also recognizes the many people behind the scenes who supported them throughout the process.

Suleiman, Colleagues Receive R01 Grant to Study Kidney Disease



Hani Suleiman, M.D., Ph.D., an Assistant Professor in the Division of Nephrology, and colleagues at Washington University in St. Louis have received a five-year, \$4 million grant from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases to study the mechanobiology of podocytes, key kidney cancer cells that are damaged in Alport syndrome and other forms of kidney disease.

Podocytes are specialized cells in the kidney that help filter blood. In Alport syndrome, these cells are injured, leading to impaired kidney function that does not heal. The researchers hypothesize that injury and the potential for healing are closely

associated with disruption by mechanical forces of the podocyte cytoskeleton, the structural scaffolding inside these cells, causing them to lose their normal architecture and detach from the kidney's filtration barrier.

Dr. Suleiman brings expertise in advanced imaging techniques and cell biology to the project. **Jeffrey Miner, Ph.D.**, a Professor of Medicine in the Division of Nephrology at the Washington University School of Medicine, will provide knowledge of kidney biology, while **Guy Genin, Ph.D.**, a Professor of Mechanical Engineering and Materials Science in the McKelvey School of Engineering, will contribute knowledge of mechanical forces in living systems.

The team will use advanced imaging, including super-resolution microscopy, to visualize the podocyte cytoskeleton in detail. They will also employ techniques to measure and manipulate the mechanical forces on cells. Their basic science findings could lay the groundwork for translational studies to develop new therapies for Alport syndrome and potentially other kidney diseases.

Originally from Syria, Dr. Suleiman received his medical education at Damascus University. He earned a doctoral degree in molecular and cellular biology at the University of Regensburg in Germany. He then obtained postdoctoral training in pathology and immunology at Washington University.

Dr. Suleiman joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2024.

Almandoz Weighs in on Anti-Obesity Medications



With the increasing recognition and prescription of anti-obesity medications like semaglutide (Ozempic, Wegovy) and tirzepatide (Mounjaro, Zepbound), these drugs are being hailed as revolutionary solutions for managing chronic overweight and obesity.

“Anti-obesity medications work by signaling the brain that we have eaten and the stomach is full, so patients feel satisfied with less food for longer, and cravings are diminished. These powerful mechanisms can result in an average of 15 to 20 percent body weight loss, which can be lifechanging for many people,” says **Jaime Almandoz, M.D.**, an Associate Professor

in the Division of Endocrinology, in [his latest MedBlog post](#). “But one common misconception about these

medications is that they're a magic bullet for better health, and it doesn't necessarily matter what you eat when you're taking them. Nothing could be further from the truth."

Colorado's Kuhn to Discuss Inflammatory Arthritis on Sept. 6



Kristi Kuhn, M.D., Ph.D., a Professor of Medicine and Head of Rheumatology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, will present the [Internal Medicine Grand Rounds](#) lecture on **Friday, Sept. 6, at 8 a.m. in D1.502**. Her topic: "Harnessing the Microbiome for Understanding Inflammatory Arthritis."

Dr. Kuhn holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Kansas and a doctoral degree in immunology from the University of Colorado. She earned her medical degree from the University of Colorado Denver Health Sciences Center and completed internal medicine residency training at Barnes-

Jewish Hospital and Washington University in St. Louis, where she served as Chief Resident and remained to obtain advanced training through a fellowship in rheumatology.

In 2013, Dr. Kuhn returned to the University of Colorado to establish her independent research program focused on specific intestinal microbe-mucosal interactions that influence the generation of systemic inflammation and the development of spondyloarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis.
